5 Scriptures to Remind You God Loves You

1. Know that God has promised never to leave you (Hebrews 13:5.)

Blessed Are They That Mourn

The Bible says, “**Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted**” (Mt 5:4). There are many doors into the life of blessedness. It does not depend on outward possessions, such as worldly goods or high birth. There is no soul of man, however illiterate, lonely or poor, to step suddenly into this life of beatitude and begin to drink of the river making glad the city of God as it is. Our Lord *lived* this life before He described it. He has opened the doors for us.

People mourn for many reasons: sickness, pain, bereavement, material loss and wounded pride. But, in this context, it is speaking of those mourning for their sins. The Apostle Paul says, “For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of: but the sorrow of the world worketh death” (2 Cor 7:10). It would include those who mourn over the sins of others (Psa 119:1-50; Dan 9:1-19). When one mourns over one’s sins, then repents and obey the gospel, one is comforted. Their sins are forgiven. One is justified and able to become a child of God with hope (Ac 2:26; 24:15; Rom 5:2, 5; 8:24; 15:13; 2 Cor 10:15; Col 1:5).

This 2nd beatitude on the surface appears to be a paradox: “**Blessed (happy) are they that mourn.**” How can mourning make you happy? Why would I ever feel blessed if I’m sad? While the world might suggest that happiness and tears can’t coexist, God paints a different picture. There is some sorrow which not only must be embraced, but is necessary; if we are to ever experience true happiness.

The Bible refers to this type of mourning as “...godly sorrow...” (2 Cor 7:10), which differs from worldly sorrow and has a much different outcome. Paul references a sorrow felt by the Corinthian church because of the 1st letter sent confronting and rebuking their sins (2 Cor 7:8-10). While he was initially concerned about how they would receive his admonition, he now rejoices seeing it filled them with “...godly sorrow...” which in turn led to their repentance. He uses their example to teach on the importance of Godly sorrow which can be distinguished from worldly sorrow by the outcome it produces. Godly sorrow leads to repentance and can ultimately lead to our salvation. In contrast, he says, “...sorrow of the world worketh death” (2 Cor 7:10).

This gives us a glimpse into what Jesus says, “**Blessed are they that mourn...**”. He is saying that Kingdom character entails being someone who grieves over sin and wrongdoing. Isaiah says, “For all those *things* hath mine hand made, and all those *things* have been, saith the LORD: but to this *man* will I look, *even to him that is poor* and of a contrite spirit, and trembleth at my word” (Isa 66:2).

These 1st two beatitudes (Mt 5:3, 4) are connected (such as Isa 66 and other Scriptures). God loves those who are humble and contrite of heart. The Lord’s half brother says, “Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you. Cleanse *your* hands, *ye* sinners; and purify *your* hearts, *ye* double minded. Be afflicted, and mourn, and weep: let your laughter be turned to mourning, and *your* joy to heaviness. Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and he shall lift you up” (Jas 4:8-10).

We should grieve over our own sins just as David (Psa 51:1-19); grieve over the sins of the church and/or community as Daniel (Dan 9:1-19); and grieve over this painful, broken, sinful world that we live in as the psalmist (Psa 119:136).

If we have this sort of “...godly sorrow...”, then Jesus promises the blessings of comfort: “**Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted**” (Mt 5:4). If our sin and those all around us moves us to mourning, then out of that sorrow (and repentance) can come the unspeakable comfort of a God who ultimately wipes away all tears (Rev 21:4). It has been said the word of God is intended to comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable. The faithful, who are suffering because of the sins of others can trust in the God of all comfort (2 Cor 1:3-5). The prophet foretold of the Lord’s anointed who would come to “heal the brokenhearted” and “comfort all who mourn” (Isa 61:1-3). But that blessing applied only to the remnant of Israel which had been humbled and grieved by the nation’s punishment for it’s sins (Eze 9:4). Thanks be to God, the anointed One has come and with a heart that is sorrowful over sin, we can experience His abundant comfort (2 Cor 1:5).
